Article 7 of the Constitution provides that family is the nucleus of society and commits the State to protect it.<sup>4</sup>

The Personal Status Code (PSC) is the main codified law that governs marriage and family relations in Tunisia,<sup>5</sup> a country with a predominantly Muslim population.

The PSC exclusively recognises civil marriages and applies to all Tunisians regardless of religion.<sup>6</sup>

Despite the equality guarantee of Article 21 of the Constitution, the PSC provides for a marital framework based on 'reciprocal' or 'complementary' rights (as state based on the rule of law.<sup>12</sup>

Although the constitution provides for gender equality and protection from gender-based violence and is substantially compliant with international standards, that does not indicate that the law is perfect or that gender justice in the relevant topic area has been fully achieved. A major challenge will be the translation of constitutional principles into national laws ranging together

although the law states the husband as head of the family, no relationship of domination over the wife is implied. Instead, the notion of the husband as head of the household is linked to his responsibility as the main provider for the needs of his wife and children, a situation that is iustified by the country's economic reality whereby women's economic participation is far lower than that of men.15

Applicable CEDAW Provision Article 16(2) Paras. 36-39 GR21 The law does not stipulate an absolute minimum age below which a marriage may not be authorised.

The minimum legal age for marriage is below the legal age of civil majority. Under Article 153 of the PSC, the legal age of civil majority is 20 for both females and males. A minor over the age of 17 attains adulthood by marriage with regard to his or her personal status and management of civil and commercial affairs.<sup>28</sup>

• Exoneration by marriage: Articles 227 a and 239 of the Penal Code which exonerate a rapist if he married his victim, and exonerate a man from punishment for kidnapping a woman if he married her, were removed from the Penal Code in 2017. 29

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#### **Divorce rights**

Is there equal right to divorce between women and men? Can the husband divorce without reason and without having to go to court? What are the main forms of divorce? Can all forms of divorce be sought only through the courts? Are the grounds for divorce the same for the husband and wife? Is unilateral divorce by repudiation (talāq) prohibited? If unilateral divorce is not prohibited, what is the procedure i.e. is the presence of the spouse to be divorced required, are witnesses required, does the spouse seeking divorce need to go to court, is the divorced spouse informed of the divorce? Is the unilateral right to divorce delegated to the wife? If so, is it by law or through the marriage contract? Is it mandatory to

Divorce rights between women and men are equal.

Article 30 of the PSC provides that divorce can only take place before a court.<sup>53</sup>

Article 31 of the PSC states that the court may grant a divorce: (i) if both spouses mutually agree to the divorce; (ii) at the request of one of the spouses on the basis of harm; (iii) at the request of the husband or the wife. <sup>54</sup>

Unilateral divorce (*talāq*) outside the court system is not recognised. <sup>55</sup>

According to civil society reports and academic research:

- Divorce legal procedures initiated by women tend to drag on for years and are rarely concluded;<sup>56</sup> and
- Some judges have been reported to refuse to acknowledge a woman's right to request for a divorce, which leads to practical difficulties despite legal entitlements.<sup>57</sup>
