

CHILD MARRIAGE

ABOLISHING THE STRUCTURE OF CHILD & FORCED MARRIAGE





This is Alma. The artwork shows her coming home from school, while a long shadow of a strange older man clutching a marriage certificate surrounds her.




This is Hana. The artwork depicts a slightly older girl tending to an agricultural land, and a long shadow of a man standing atop some steps appears in the background.

Child marriage must be eliminated. Although some governments and religious authorities say their laws cannot be changed for religious reasons, Islamic teachings support raising the minimum age of marriage to 18 for both boys and girls. In fact, several countries have reformed their laws to end the practice.

ABUSE

Children who marry early are more vulnerable to domestic violence, sexual abuse, and marital rape by their spouses or in-laws, and often cannot speak out against this violence.

LOSS OF RIGHTS

Children can lose their status and rights as children, since married persons are considered adults in some countries.

REPRODUCTIVE RIGHTS

Child brides may suffer physical, mental, and emotional health difficulties because of the strains placed on them before they have fully matured. Such strains include physical labour, trauma from sexual relations and bearing children at a young age, and higher rates of sexually transmitted diseases. Young mothers face higher maternal mortality rates, and infants born to young mothers have a significantly higher chance of dying at an early age.



EDUCATION

Children who marry often do not complete their education and lose the skills, independence, and subsequent benefits an education provides.


HEALTH RISKS

High fertility rates and population growth caused by child marriage can strain national resources, including health, welfare, and education systems.



The international consensus that the procedural definition of childhood should apply to humans up to the age of 18 years - is perfectly compatible with what Islam enjoins. Islam has nothing to do with the custom of child marriage; reference to early marriages can be found nowhere in the Qur'an.

HOW YOU CAN BE PART OF THE SOLUTION

01. PREPARE

- First: Do research on the reasons children are forced to get married under 18 in your community. Start asking: Is it a cultural or religious phenomenon? Is it economical for the parents? Is it something entirely different?
- Second: Based on your research, think of the message that you want to spread. For example,
 if parents marry off their daughters for economic reasons, you can construct targeted
 messaging about how child marriages trap young girls in poverty.
- Third: Now that you have the information and messaging, you can come up with tactics to raise awareness in your circles and community. You can do this by organizing multiple activities. You can choose drama/theatre, music/songs, or reaching out to your community to spread the message.

Most importantly is to remember to always set a goal: who and how many parents and/or girls do you want to reach with your message?

HOW YOU CAN BE PART OF THE SOLUTION

02. CAMPAIGN TIME:

You don't have to work on the campaign by yourself. Look for people around you that can help you or join an existing organization that is already fighting for the same cause. Keep in mind that this is a very personal issue and it can be hard for others to hear you.

Keep going but stay safe and sensitive to your context. For every person you reach with confidence and respect, you can literally change a life!

03. DEMAND

Write to your Member of Parliament/Assemblyperson and demand they effectively address child and forced marriage. Inform them to set the minimum age of marriage to 18 years for boys and girls without any exceptions; or if the minimum age is set at 18 years with exception – demand for the exception to be abolished.
